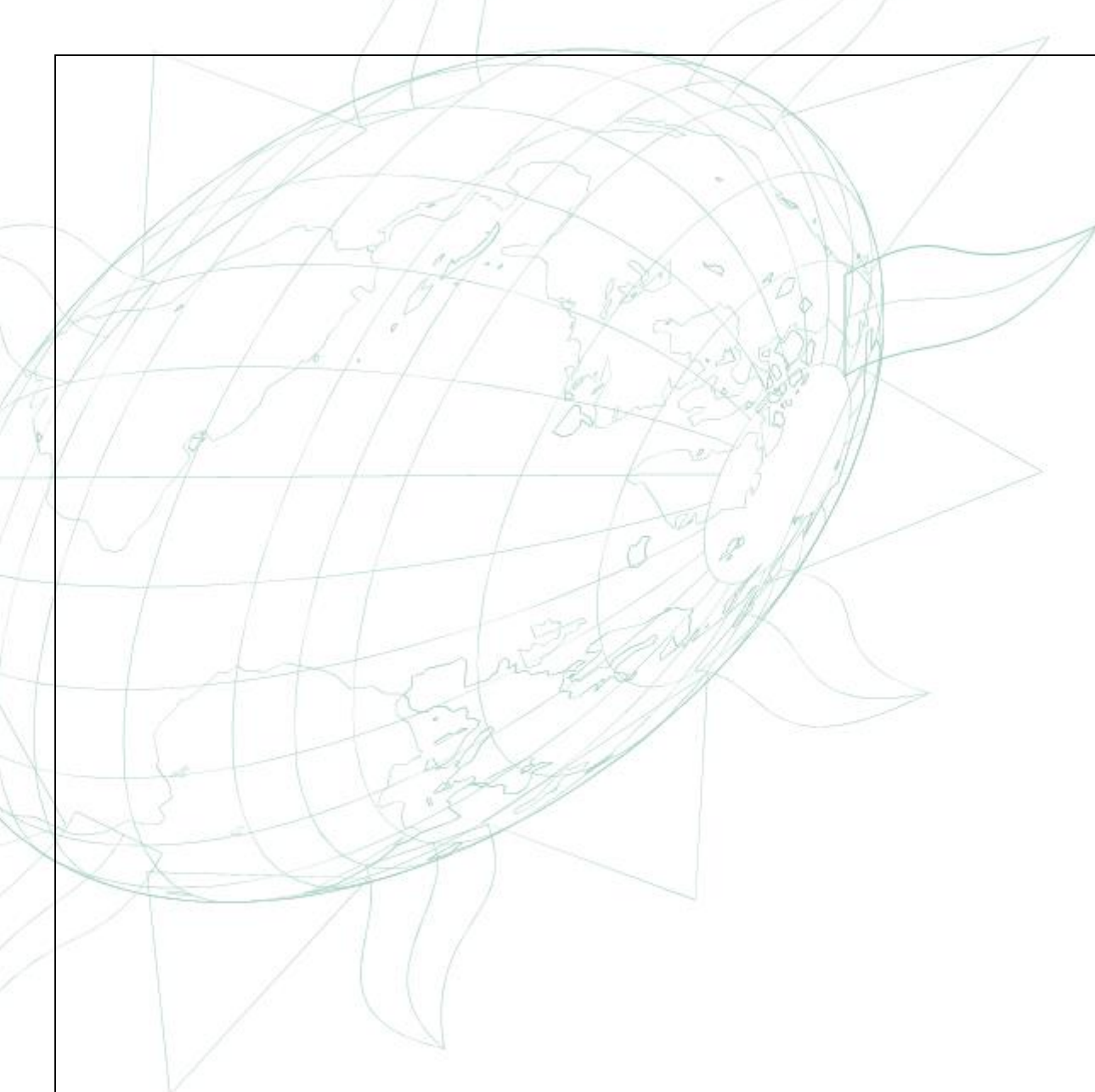

"While we welcome the new partnership we are concerned that instead of the backlogs decreasing there is actually an increase. We also saw contradictions with the last report served. The police might need to update the committee on a monthly basis," Joemat-Pettersson said.

Professor Tulio de Oliveira, director of the KwaZulu-Natal Research Innovation and Sequencing Platform (Krisp), said they were approached because they had shown during the pandemic that government and academic institutions with high capacity for DNA testing can work together.

"These partnerships are very important and we are excited for it. We have high-level machines and our laboratories also have high accreditation from the SA National Accreditation System (Sanas) ISO. We are well equipped to assist the police with the DNA backlog."

Stellenbosch University spokesperson Martin Viljoen said: "The Central Analytical Facilities (CAF) at Stellenbosch University is looking forward to the prospect of working with the GBVF Response Fund in contributing to eradicating the national crises of gender-based violence and femicide."

DNA for Africa regional director Vanessa Lynch said it would be interesting to compare how swiftly the private forensic laboratories are able get through their samples as they don't have the same issues which have plagued the FSL.

"The minister has endorsed the use of the private laboratories to assist the backlog, which is a good thing, as long as the same chemistries and methodologies are used."

According to the report, 14 contracts have been concluded with six still outstanding.

"In a laboratory, everything needs to be functional in order for the whole system to operate. I know some robotic machines have not been maintained or serviced so the outstanding contracts need to be concluded urgently.

"If a sample is not analysed, the DNA profile cannot be loaded into the database, meaning serial offenders cannot be identified and they will continue to rape people.

"If court cases are not concluded by showing how an accused is linked to the crime scene sample, then these people continue to act with impunity. I believe there is a direct correlation between the rise in the DNA backlog and rape statistics," Lynch said.

It appears as if some progress was made in dealing with the backlog but police need to show more transparency and accountability by going back to Parliament to report on a monthly basis as suggested due to past inaccuracies or misleading information in reports, she said.

"Survivors need access to their own information and a DNA backlog dashboard will ensure the police account to the public in respect of their promised progress."

TRIBUTES TO STUDENT

SLAIN University of Fort Hare student Nosicelo Mtebeni chose to study towards a law degree because she "did not like seeing an injustice" inflicted on other children.

This is according to her aunt Nomvula Beauty Gugushe who spoke at the memorial service of her niece in East London yesterday.

Mtebeni, 23, was murdered and dismembered last week. Some of her body parts were found in a suitcase dumped in the street not far from where she shared a room with her boyfriend Alutha Pasile, 25, in Quigney, East London.

Pasile was arrested and appeared in court this week on a murder charge.

He allegedly confessed to police that he killed Mtebeni after discovering she was cheating.

Her murder has left her family and the broader community devastated.

Gugushe said the support they received had helped them to cope with the ordeal.

"We are feeling a bit stronger. Initially, we did not know how we were going to deal with something of this nature, but because of the support we have received in East London, from the police, the university and the broader community, this painful trauma is lighter than it was at the time of hearing about it," she said.

Gugushe said Mtebeni did not like seeing injustice done to other people.

"She was a child who did not like seeing others being violated. She also

did not like seeing a woman being violated.

"I am, therefore, certain that if Nosicelo had more time to live, she was going to be one of the women who would be fighting for children

and women's rights."

Advocate Andile Mini, president of the university's convocation, said that they lost a student who was soon going to be a member of the Fort Hare alumni.

"The message of the convocation is clear, that the spirit of Nosicelo shall never die, while we live.

"As the country is battling to control an unprecedented stigma of coronavirus, we are also faced with another

pandemic that has anointed itself as the shame of the nation; gender-based violence," he said.

Mini said the convocation had taken a decision which they have communicated to Mtebeni's family, "that for the duration of our term, in the next four years, we want to adopt Nosicelo's family, and provide the support that is needed.

From the meeting (we held) among ourselves as the executive of the convocation, we have made a contribution (to the family) to the tune of R150 000, from ourselves.

"We will fund raise enough money for the family for the duration of our term. We are also planning to approach the university with regard to the legacy project that will be named after Nosicelo," said Mini.

The university's vice-chancellor, Sakhela Buhlungu said that they had been "robbed of a future Constitutional Court judge".

"This child arrived here (at Fort Hare in 2017) and was going to finish her degree in regulation time," Buhlungu said.

Higher Education and Training Deputy Minister Buti Manamela said: "The story of Nosicelo is part of the broader story of women in our country, who, today, have to live with the reality that they can be attacked, raped and murdered anywhere and at any time of the day."

Mtebeni is survived by her parents from Matatiele, Kholisile and Ntombizandile Mtebeni, and her siblings.

The details of the funeral have not yet been announced.

EFF open to coalitions after local government electionsZINTLE MAHLATI

EFF leader Julius Malema says the party will be open to coalition partnerships after the local government elections, which could see his party play a more central role in leadership positions.

Malema said yesterday that the party would engage in coalition talks only on a case-by-case basis in municipalities.

He said the EFF was looking to play a bigger role than it did after the 2016 local government elections.

The EFF had played a role in 2016 when the DA sought partners to enable it to run the City of Johannesburg and the City of Tshwane. When it agreed to coalitions, no members of the EFF took up leadership positions in the metros.

This time, Malema said, the situation would be different.

"And this time around, we are going into coalition government ourselves as the EFF. We think we have amassed the necessary experience, and we have got men and women who are now capable enough to lead successful municipalities. And those coalitions will be based on that.

"Be assured, after these LGEs (local government elections) there will be metros with EFF mayors – either directly or through coalition," Malema said.

Fossil fuel addiction may derail greenhouse pledgeLISA ISAACS

SOUTH Africa has committed to reducing emissions through the Paris Agreement, but the government's addiction to fossil fuels threatens to derail this promise, environmentalists have said.

Forestry, Fisheries and Environment Minister Barbara Creecy this week released South Africa's 7th National Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Inventory Report 2000 to 2017, which showed that emissions have increased by 10.4% over the 17-year period.

The report covers sources of greenhouse gas emissions under four sectors: Energy, Industrial Processes and Product Use (IPPU), Agriculture, Forestry and Other Land Use (AFOLU) and Waste.

The report showed an increasing trend in emissions in the energy, IPPU and waste sectors. Energy emissions were highest in 2009, after which there was a 3.1% decline to 2011.

In 2012 there was a 3.6% increase in emissions, followed by an average annual decline of 0.8% to 2016.

A 1.5% increase was seen in the 2017 emissions from the energy sector.

IPPU emissions reached a maximum in 2007, followed by an annual average decline of 5.8% to 2010.

There was an 11.5% increase in 2011, after which emissions stabilised to 2016 with a 0.3% annual average rate of increase.

The waste sector has shown a steady increase in emissions since 2000, with an average annual

increase of 2.7%.

Greenpeace Africa Climate and Energy campaigner Thandile Chinyavanhu said they were hopeful the next decade would not present a rise in emissions.

"South Africa has committed to reducing emissions. Unfortunately, the government's addiction to fossil fuels threatens to derail this.

"The Gas Amendment Bill and the Upstream Petroleum Resource Development Bill are misaligned to our emission reduction targets and the climate bill, and if passed will lock South Africa into a high emissions trajectory. South Africa's commitment remains highly insufficient," Chinyavanhu said.

"Despite having a robust policy framework, South Africa lacks the political will to implement the change we so desperately need, because our leaders have erroneously tethered our economic prosperity to polluting businesses like Sasol and Eskom."

Economic researcher with The Green Connection Gillian Hamilton said emissions should be decreasing, in line with the country's commitment to the Paris Agreement.

"To reduce the impact of global warming and climate change, we need to drastically reduce the emissions from the energy sector. The big focus is changing our energy system, and that can only be done with political will," Hamilton said.

Creecy said the inventory was vital in supporting implementation of South Africa's Nationally Determined Contribution, to be tabled ahead of the international climate talks in November.

Magashule's legal team accuse 3 high court judges of bias for 'pre-judging' caseKAILENE PILLAY

SUSPENDED ANC secretary-general Ace Magashule's legal team accused three Johannesburg High Court judges of judicial bias in his suspension case – which he took to the courts to overturn.

Magashule returned to the Johannesburg High Court yesterday, where he sought leave to appeal its decision to uphold his suspension from the ANC.

Magashule was suspended by the governing party in May, in a letter signed by ANC deputy secretary-general Jessie Duarte, in which the party said that he would be temporarily suspended until the outcome of his legal proceedings.

His suspension came after the ANC's deadline for leaders, implicated in and facing corruption charges before the courts, to step aside from their roles had passed.

Representing the suspended leader, advocate Dali Mpofu SC based his argument on three broad areas – the legal issues, merits of the case, and judicial bias. While arguing the judicial bias point, Mpofu said the lower court pre-judged the matter and prejudiced his client.

They believe a higher court will come to a different conclusion.

Judge Jody Kollapen asked Mpofu to clarify his point.

"Are you saying that this case was determined on the basis of a pre-judgment?" asked Kollapen. Mpofu agreed.

"Yes, we are saying that the matter was pre-judged and I am not saying in the overall out-

come in the case, I am talking about the specific issue of the authority of Miss Duarte. Remember that is a pivotal issue in this case, which would determine whether the suspension was lawful or unlawful. So, prejudging that issue is just as good as prejudging the whole case, in a particular sense," Mpofu said.

The high court ruled that the ANC was within its right to suspend Magashule after he failed to comply with its step-aside rule.

While Mpofu argued that the step aside rule was implemented "factionally", advocate Wim Trengove, for President Cyril Ramaphosa and the governing party, stuck to their argument that there was nothing unconstitutional about Magashule's suspension.

Trengove said the step-aside rule was "an important mechanism designed so that people suspected of corruption did not occupy positions of power".

He also argued that Mpofu abused the courts as a "springboard" to launch a "scurrilous" attack on Ramaphosa.

He submitted that leave to appeal be dismissed with costs.

However, Mpofu argued that Ramaphosa's recent Cabinet reshuffle and appointments of certain ministers had also included ANC members facing serious corruption charges.

He argued that the reshuffle indicated the "selective and factional" application of the step-aside rule.

Judges Kollapen, Sharise Weiner, and Edwin Molahlehi stood the matter down and assured the parties they would deal with it urgently, and that judgment would be ready soon.

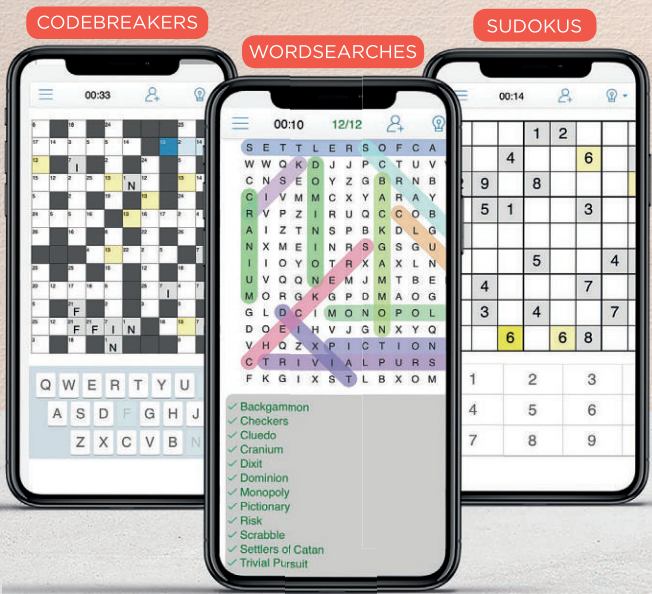

When it comes to tipping the hat to women who play a vital role in the community, no-one deserves it more than Khayelitsha resident Ntombikazi Rwayi. Better known by her nickname Ma Agnes, the 60-year-old is the Westlake Conservation Centre’s restoration facility team leader.

“As we celebrate and honour women, I believe it is only fitting that we honour Ma Agnes – she is the true epitome of inspiration and hard work,” said Mayco Member for Spatial Planning and the Environment Marian Nieuwoudt. “Ma Agnes’s story is one of success and speaks to our commitment not only to attract talent, but give it an environment to thrive in.

Ma Agnes has no formal environmental education, but learnt about plants from her father, who loved gardening and taught her and her siblings how to look after plants such as spinach. Now, with the City, she takes care of plants, empowers Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP) workers and has a passion to grow specialised fynbos plants.

Despite her current prowess in her field, she was not always as knowledgeable on the topic and has grown her understanding of the environment through years of work.

Ma Agnes first worked for Abalimi Bezekhaya in Khayelitsha in 1996, a non-profit, micro-farming organisation.

From there she moved to a private nursery in Westlake, where she learnt more about plants, and also worked at Kirstenbosch Botanical Gardens and schools in Khayelitsha.

In 2014, Ma Agnes began her journey with the City, managing the restoration facility staff, training the new EPWP intake groups from scratch, propagating approximately 200 000 plants per year, many of

which are unique and highly threatened fynbos plants that require specialised knowledge to work with, caring for plants earmarked for other sites as well as cleaning and preparing seeds for re-seeding programmes.

Nieuwoudt commended Ma Agnes on her strength and resilience, saying: “She has not allowed her circumstances to dictate to her. Having no formal education in the field does not limit her. She continues to empower and nurture countless people about propagating various plant species, and is not about to stop.”

Ma Agnes says what she wants people to learn from her story is how vital the environment is.

“I would like to see more people understand the importance of nature because lives depend on it,” she said. “I am particularly keen to see a lot of young people learn about caring for nature from a very young age. Nurturing the youth is one thing.

“Seeing them flourish and making a career of it is so rewarding. I would like to encourage women, in particular, to consider a career in this field. That way we can preserve nature for the next generations. Also, love for nature should be about motivation and not money.”

Murder strikes too close to home

The killing of University of Fort Hare student Nosiselo Mtebeni earlier this month has ripped off the scabs of a wound incurred much closer to home.

Following media reports of the Eastern Cape student's murder and dismemberment ("University of Fort Hare to hold day of mourning for slain student", *News24*, 23 August), the University of Cape Town's (UCT) vice-chancellor Professor Mamokgethi Phakeng urged all to take action against sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV).

In a communication sent out last week, Phakeng said it was but two years ago that the university had been reeling from the rape and murder of Uyinene Mrwetyana.

"Today I am devastated that I feel the same heartache I felt in 2019. On behalf of UCT, I extend our heartfelt condolences to Nosiselo's family, friends and the University of Fort Hare community on this terrible loss."

Mtebeni (23), a final-year law student, was allegedly murdered by her boyfriend two

weeks ago. Her body parts were found stuffed inside two bags, while more parts were allegedly found in possession of the 25-year-old man.

According to the National Prosecuting Authority, the murder accused confessed to killing Mtebeni in a fit of jealousy (“Family of man accused of dismembering Nosiselo Mtebeni says he wouldn’t hurt a fly”, *News24*, 28 August)

Phakeng said South Africa was being robbed of our bright stars of the future.

“Nosiselo had her heart set on making a difference. Her classmate told the media that Nosiselo wanted to be appointed as a Constitutional Court judge someday. To aim for such a goal, she must have had loving and confident support from her family and friends. She must have felt empowered to serve her country.”

She urged all members of the UCT community to take steps against SGBV.

“Every year, across our country, in all kinds of communities and homes, women and girls

face SGBV from the men they look to for love and protection: whether it is a boyfriend or a husband, a father or other relative, a neighbour or friend or colleague at work or in school or university.

“We may not know these women and girls. But they are our responsibility. I am asking you to make a commitment to do what you can to protect the future they hold. Because there are effective actions each of us can take.”

One such action was to send a digital letter/postcard to Parliament. UCT's Office of Inclusivity and Change (Oic) helped to coordinate this national campaign on campus, to petition Parliament to end violence against, and the exploitation of women and girls. The Uyinene Mrwetyana Foundation website provided a template where messages could be submitted. All submissions were attached as a petition delivered to the Presidency on Saturday 28 August.

The Oic is also hosting the “Empowered Through Vulnerability” survivor support se-

ries. This is a series of weekly live engagements on life after sexual violence and post-traumatic growth, featuring input by expert panellists and survivors of sexual violence from the UCT Survivor Support Group. These sessions, streamed via Zoom and Instagram Live, include segments on the survivors' lived experiences, criminal prosecution, mental health diagnosis and well-being (including rape trauma syndrome), myths and stigmas surrounding rape and what life is like after sexual violence and trauma. Everyone is welcome to participate.

"I especially call on the men of UCT to rise up and help to hold each other accountable for the attitudes, unconscious behaviour and direct actions that contribute to SGBV. Every woman who is destroyed by SGBV had something to offer her family, community and country. Through SGBV we lost that significant potential. It is our responsibility to do everything we can to end this destruction," concluded Phakeng.

Don't become complacent when it comes to home safety

Good personal safety habits should never be overlooked or forgotten.

They play a major role in preventing potential crime and should be encouraged even if you live behind the walls of a residential estate or security complex.

“Residents often become complacent concerning their security and think they can drop their guard the moment they drive through the estate’s gates. We urge residents to remember they have a part to play in keeping themselves and fellow residents safe,” says Charnel Hattingh, head of marketing and communications at Fidelity ADT.

Crime syndicates often target lifestyle estates exactly because those residents tend to become complacent about their home security.

"A particularly serious problem is the information passed on by people who live on or have regular jobs within estates. Armed with information, and their reconnaissance, the criminals keep finding new ways of gaining access to estates," Hat-

tingh adds.

Estate security companies are constantly on the lookout for ways to improve their service to residents and have introduced a range of technological measures such as access control systems, movement-activated cameras and constant patrols.

Regardless of the measures that may be in place, it remains vital that residents play their part.

Estate residents are encouraged to take note of the following safety tips:

- Do not rely on perimeter security alone: While perimeter security measures have been successful in driving down crime in estates, residents still need to take precautions in their homes.

Once criminals gain access to properties within estates they often have free rein because residents become complacent about their home security within these developments.

Be sure to lock doors and windows and ensure vehicles are locked, even if they are parked in a garage and do not leave

valuables lying around, particularly where they may be visible to passers-by.

- Check the references of your domestic worker and gardener: Very often crimes within estates are carried out with the assistance of a domestic staff member.

Make sure you have properly checked your domestic worker's and gardener's work references, and educate them on keeping your home secure when you are not there.

- Watch out if there is construction taking place: Having construction workers on-site within estates has historically resulted in elevated crime levels.

Whether this is a direct result of construction workers having access to the estate, or because of the increase in traffic in and out of the estate remains a mystery. Take extra precautions.

- **Report suspicious behaviour:** One of the modus operandi within these estates is for a crime syndicate to move into a home for a while.

During this time, these criminals moni-

tor the behaviour of residents and initiate house break-ins in the estate before moving out.

Be alert when entering and exiting the estate. Criminals have targeted residents leaving from or returning to estates and hijacked them a few metres from the gates or followed them inside and robbed them by tailgating them as they enter the premises. The reality is that people relax and become less and less alert the closer they get to home.


- Do not think that just because there is a security guard at the gate that you can become too comfortable.

- **Know your neighbours:** Make sure you have the contact details for the homeowners next door, so that you can reach them in case of an emergency or if you suspect that something might be amiss.

- Keep the contact details for any security firms deployed on the estate close by, so that you can contact them quickly in case of an emergency or if you notice suspicious behaviour.
